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FOREWORD

From time to time, it has been suggested that the doctrine of comparative negligence should be adopted in this state by legislative enactment. In our December, 1944, BULLETIN we published an article by the Honorable George Templar on "The Doctrine of Comparative Negligence." At the June, 1946, meeting of the Central Kansas Bar Association, Thomas A. Cowan, Professor of Jurisprudence of the College of Law of the University of Nebraska, delivered an address on "The Comparative Negligence Doctrine in Automobile Cases," which the Judicial Council believes deserves wider publicity than it received and accordingly we include it in this issue of the BULLETIN. The Judicial Council would appreciate the comment and views of bench and bar on the general question whether the doctrine should be adopted in this state.

The Judicial Council here expresses its thanks to the various judges and the clerks of the several courts for their promptness and efficiency in reporting statistical information requested by the Judicial Council, summaries of which have been prepared and are printed herein. We are also indebted to Randal C. Harvey, secretary of the Judicial Council, for his analysis of and comment upon the statistics.

Attention is directed to the article on "The Practising Law Institute" as a means whereby lawyers may have the benefit of refresher courses and extended study, and also to the article on the Stormont Medical Library. This library has been segregated from the general State Library and affords a ready access to the latest medical texts and magazines by members of the medical and legal professions.

THE COMPARATIVE NEGLIGENCE DOCTRINE IN AUTOMOBILE CASES

The doctrine of comparative negligence is a device invented to mitigate in some measure the harshness of the common law rule that a plaintiff who is guilty of any degree of negligence which contributes to his injury may not recover in tort from a negligent defendant.

This rule of contributory negligence has been attacked by eminent jurists on and off the bench for over a century, but despite these attacks it has survived, although its modern form is far different from the once rigorous common law doctrine.

The rule that contributory negligence bars recovery has excited the interest and elicited the explanations of many writers learned in the law. Various reasons have been advanced in the course of years for the doctrine. One of these is the "clean hands" rule. It is said that where plaintiff is himself at fault he should not recover even though the major share of the blame lies with the defendant. This theory has long since been discarded, together with the cases based on it such as those which denied a plaintiff recovery because he had been driving on Sunday. Now it is well recognized that the plaintiff's fault must be a proximate cause of the injury if he is to be barred as contributorily negligent. His otherwise illegal or even reprehensible conduct is irrelevant.

Another explanation is that the jury is by nature incapable of apportioning damages. But the apportionment of damages in tort is really of no more complex a nature than apportionment or determination of damages in contract, and this theory is not well received today as an explanation for contributory negligence.

Still another explanation is that the jury does not know how to apportion fault, but this explanation suffers the same effect as the above. Under proper instructions, fault or negligence which is merely a question of fact is no more difficult than hundreds of other legal concepts juries have to wrestle with.

Finally, the explanation most widely accepted is that the plaintiff's negligence is an intervening cause insulating his injury from defendant's negligence.

Despite the lip service which is almost universally paid to the rule of contributory negligence, the scope of the doctrine has been whittled down by the courts to a certain extent in recent years. To begin with, the rule that the plaintiff's fault, if it is to bar recovery, must be a proximate cause of his injury, permits plaintiffs to recover in situations where liability would be denied in the past. Again, where plaintiff's misconduct plays no part in bringing about the injury but increases the damages, courts will sometimes apportion the loss. Thus in *O'Keefe v. Kansas City Western Ry. Co.*, 87 Kan. 322, 124 P. 416, plaintiff's intoxicated condition aggravated the injuries suffered from a fall although it did not contribute to the fall. The court here permitted apportionment of the damages. The rule of contributory negligence is not applicable where defendant's fault is intentional or his conduct is wilfull, wanton, reckless or otherwise disregardful of the safety of life or property.

Moreover, the rule of division of negligence into degrees such as slight, ordinary, and gross has the effect of mitigating the severity of the rule of contributory negligence. Of late years, courts have been showing increased distaste for this doctrine of degrees of negligence, although it must be said that in proportion as the doctrine is falling into disfavor with courts it is coming in for favorable attention by legislatures.

Thus, in many situations the courts themselves have relaxed the mechanical operations of the rule of contributory negligence and some slight gains must be credited to the judiciary in this connection.

It remained for the legislatures, however, to make a frontal attack on the doctrine with rather serious consequences so far as the quantum of judicial tort business is concerned. Employer's liability acts and workmen's compensation statutes simply abolished the defense of contributory negligence as a bar to recovery. The liability acts usually adopt comparative negligence; the compensation statutes usually abolish the doctrine of negligence altogether. The failure of the judicial system to compensate adequately for industrial injuries, the harshness of the defenses against workmen, voluntary assumption of risk, contributory negligence, and the fellow servant rule all induced the legislature to entrust the operation of the matter either to administrative agencies or special tribunals unhampered by the outmoded forms and defenses of the common law courts.

With the advent of the automobile on the road once more in prewar numbers, the prospect is imminent that the second most numerous source of tort litigation will be transferred from our common law courts to administrative tribunals. The uniform motor vehicle safety responsibility statute is being adopted in one state after another. It compels evidence of financial responsibility after even a trivial accident has happened. The act is administered by executive agencies of the government. It is obvious that it takes only one step to advance from administering a responsibility statute to administering a liability or compensation statute.

It is interesting to speculate on the form these new statutes might take. Following the analogy of employers' liability acts, an automobile liability act might well abolish the defense of contributory negligence, and in the case of guests the defenses of voluntary assumption of risk and imputed negligence. Just as under the employers' liability act, the plaintiff's fault, if any, would go to diminish damages.

An automobile compensation act would probably turn the whole problem over to an administrative agency or specialized court which would apportion damages without respect to voluntary assumption of risk, contributory negligence, imputed negligence, or the rule which denies contribution among joint tortfeasors. A system of double entry bookkeeping would be devised, each party to the accident being credited with the amount of his injuries and debited with the amount attributable to his fault, a balance struck, and an award made accordingly. Appellate courts then would only be interested in abuse of administrative discretion.

Whether or not this prospect becomes a reality, it is coming to be realized more and more that contributory negligence as a complete bar to recovery is an outmoded rule of law. This is particularly so in automobile cases, because contributory negligence is at least arguable in the great percentage of

the cases. If the plaintiff was driving, the defendant usually can make some kind of a colorable claim that the driver was negligent. If both parties were driving, it is often a matter of whose witnesses to believe. One batch says the plaintiff was driving fifteen miles an hour, sounded his horn, signaled with his hand and whistled at the crossing. Another batch will say he was doing forty or fifty miles an hour, was arguing with his wife in the back seat, lighting a cigaret, driving with one hand on the wheel, etc. Potentially, in collision cases, contributory negligence is a standard and expected defense. And even if the plaintiff is a pedestrian, although in a better position, still the defense of contributory negligence comes up against him in an astonishingly large percentage of the cases.

The above being so, the first aspect of legislative reform in this branch of tort law is almost certain to be abolition of the defense of contributory negligence as a bar to recovery and a substitution of at least comparative negligence, unless the revision is so thorough-going that comparative negligence simply becomes lost in the shuffle, as happened in workmen's compensation.

We come then to the subject of comparative negligence. This doctrine exists in restricted areas in quite a number of states, particularly in the field of railroads and other public utilities. Here it is a rough and ready balance by the legislature of the superior resources and specialized counsel available to the utilities. In the matter of general comparative negligence, we find that the doctrine has been adopted in five states. These are in the order of their adoption: Mississippi, Nebraska, Georgia, Wisconsin, South Dakota. I have hearsay information that it is being considered in a number of other states. England, the home of the contributory negligence rule, has finally abolished it and adopted a general comparative negligence statute.*

The Mississippi statute is a general unrestricted statute. It provides simply:

In all actions brought for personal injuries . . . the fact that the person injured . . . may have been guilty of contributory negligence shall not bar a recovery, but damages shall be diminished by the jury in proportion to the amount of negligence attributable to the person injured. . . .

Miss. Code Ann. (1930), § 511.

This comparative negligence statute has been applied in Mississippi satisfactorily for over thirty-five years. Courts, juries, counsels and litigants seem well satisfied with it, although specialized defense attorneys say that it results in many more plaintiff verdicts than elsewhere, particularly where large corporations are defendant.

The Nebraska statute, with which we are mainly concerned, and which was adopted verbatim by South Dakota in 1941, has been on the books since 1913. It is only a partial comparative negligence statute. It provides as follows:

In all actions brought to recover damages for injuries to a person or to his property caused by the negligence of another, the fact that the plaintiff may have been guilty of contributory negligence shall not bar a recovery when the contributory negligence of the plaintiff was slight and the negligence of the defendant was gross in comparison, but the contributory negligence of the plaintiff shall be considered by the jury in the mitigation of damages in

proportion to the amount of the contributory negligence attributable to the plaintiff; and all questions of negligence and contributory negligence shall be for the jury. R. S. Neb. (1943) 25-1151.

It is to be noted that the legislature adopted the distinction of slight and gross negligence. These terms, which have come in for much deserved criticism because of the difficulty of their application, are used to mitigate the harshness of the flat rule that contributory negligence, however slight, completely bars recovery. The operation of the statute, therefore, calls for a judicial definition of slight and gross negligence even though many courts, including those of Nebraska before the passage of this act, declared that the single rule of "care under the circumstances" sufficed to encompass the three degrees of slight, ordinary and gross negligence. Difficult as these terms are to apply, they nevertheless permit the courts to leave to the jury the determination of the degrees of negligence of plaintiff as compared with defendant whenever more than one conclusion may reasonably be drawn from the facts.

A further complication in the act is to be noted. The negligence of the plaintiff must be compared with the negligence of the defendant. The act does not say that if the negligence of the plaintiff is slight and that of the defendant gross, the plaintiff is not barred. The negligence of the two parties must be compared. This means that patterns of slight and gross negligence per se cannot be developed, and the result is in effect that the triers of fact are forced to make a comparison independently in every case.

It is true that inasmuch as the act has been on the books for thirty-three years litigation has served to give certain hints for the guidance of practitioners. Nevertheless, a survey of the cases shows that in the main the fact situations are so varied that little help can be had from a survey of them for the purpose of eliciting rules to guide counsel or trial courts. The best that can be said is that one can detect a tendency in recent years to ease up somewhat on the quantum of negligence which the plaintiff may have attributed to him and still evade a directed verdict, or a reversal on appeal.

The greater the number of cases that are left to juries, the more verdicts for plaintiffs in Nebraska as elsewhere. Hence, the real effectiveness of the statute depends on the willingness of courts to allow the jury to keep the cases. It will be remembered that the Nebraska act provides that "all questions of negligence and contributory negligence shall be for the jury." It might seem to have been the intention of the legislature that the courts should accept the determination of the jury on these matters as final. Nevertheless, the Nebraska courts have retained the control which is usually exercised over negligence litigation and find, as a matter of law, that certain situations constitute slight or gross negligence. Nor do the courts hesitate to make the comparison between slight and gross negligence as a matter of law if they believe reasonable minds should not differ in conclusions to be drawn from the facts.

The question of instructions to the jury is a perplexing one under this act, and many cases went up and down before proper practice was fixed. In 1945, the Association of District Judges of Nebraska worked out a set of Standardized Instructions to Juries of which Nos. 37 and 38, 24 Neb. L. R. 219, are on the subject of comparative negligence.

The situation in comparative negligence is complicated in Nebraska in automobile cases by the existence of the guest statute. This provides that a guest may not recover unless the host operator was intoxicated or was guilty of gross negligence in the operation of the car. The question arose whether the comparative negligence act had any application to the guest statute and the court at first held that it did not. This case was *Sheehy v. Abboud*, 126 Neb. 554, decided March 30, 1934. However, on March 10, 1934, the supreme court of Kansas in *Koster v. Matson*, 139 Kan. 124, 30 P.2d 107, had before it a case involving an accident in Nebraska and under the conflict of laws rule in torts, it applied Nebraska law. In the district court, Judge Bennett had ruled that the two statutes must be read *in pari materia*. Justice Harvey of the Kansas supreme court approved this ruling in his concurring opinion. Finally, in 1943, in *Landrum v. Roddy*, 143 Neb. 934, the Nebraska supreme court approved Judge Bennett's interpretation of the Nebraska guest statute and stated that the comparative negligence act must be read together with it, and overruled *Sheehy v. Abboud* to the extent that it was in conflict.

This is certainly a clear and forcible example of the operation of the principle of "comity" in the conflict of laws and exhibits commendable modesty and deference on the part of the justices of the supreme court of Nebraska.

The result is that in guest cases, comparative negligence will probably be a common feature. It necessitated a standardized instruction No. 39, 24 Neb. L. R. 220, by the Association of District Judges of Nebraska which follows:

"(You are instructed that) you should first turn your attention to the question of whether or not the defendant was guilty of negligence and, if so, whether his negligence amounted to gross negligence as defined in these instructions. In measuring the negligence of the defendant, if any, you should consider his negligence by itself, and if you find that his negligence fell in any degree short of gross negligence, then (by virtue of the guest statute hereinbefore referred to), the plaintiff cannot recover in any event, and any question as to plaintiff's negligence, if any, becomes wholly immaterial.

"On the other hand, if upon consideration of defendant's negligence, if any, and independent of any negligence on the part of the plaintiff, you find that the defendant was guilty of gross negligence, then the question of whether the plaintiff was negligent becomes material, and if upon consideration of that issue you also find that the plaintiff was guilty of negligence, you should then compare the negligence of the plaintiff with that of the defendant, and if you find that the negligence of the plaintiff when compared with that of the defendant was more than slight, then again the plaintiff cannot recover.

"But if you find that the negligence of the plaintiff, when compared with the gross negligence of the defendant, was only slight negligence, the plaintiff may recover, but it is then your duty to deduct from the whole amount of damages, if any, suffered by the plaintiff such proportion thereof as the contributory negligence chargeable to the plaintiff bears to the entire negligence as shown by the evidence and return a verdict for the balance only."

It is submitted that any jury that could understand this instruction in its entirety is entitled to a gold medal. Still, if the trial judge solemnly gives this instruction and the jury just as solemnly listens to it and goes its mysterious way, the appellate court is not likely to reverse on the ground of misdirection however much it may play fast and loose with the degree of slight compared with gross negligence as a matter of law.

But the real nub of the difficulty has not been touched yet. What of the

practitioner forced to marshal his evidence and prove his case in a guest situation where the defendant alleges contributory negligence? Keeping the evidence straight and retaining one's own sanity is indeed a two-fisted job under such circumstances.

It is submitted that much of the difficulty would disappear from the operation of a comparative negligence act if one similar to the Mississippi statute is adopted. That act contains only one sentence. (Page 129.) It is easy to apply and presents no more hazards on appeal than an ordinary case in which contributory negligence is not alleged. It dispenses with the difficult distinction between slight, ordinary and gross negligence and makes no attempt to compare as a matter of law the negligence of the plaintiff with that of the defendant. The only comparison takes place where it should—in the question of damages. As a matter of common knowledge, juries make the apportionment whenever they can anyway. The simple comparative negligence statute permits them lawfully to apportion whenever the negligence of plaintiff and defendant combine to cause injury.

THE PRACTISING LAW INSTITUTE

"Selecting a Jury" by Harry Sabbath Bodin contains many items to be considered when selecting jurors who will be likely to be fair in the consideration of the case.

For students in particular, eminent professors have outlined the Significant Developments in the Law During the War Years in their own specialized field. In writing on "Insurance" Edwin W. Patterson stresses the importance of the Supreme Court decision that insurance is "commerce" within the meaning of the "commerce clause" of the Federal Constitution, and of the adoption by statute in New York of a third standard fire insurance policy, subsequently adopted in several other states. Austin Wakeman Scott sets forth the newest decisions and latest trends in all phases of "Trusts."

In the General Practice field Carlos L. Israels and Raymond J. Gorman discuss in detail the organization of a business corporation with capital stock, taking into consideration the basic purposes of incorporation, capital structures, relationship of ownership to management, preparation of the certificate of incorporation, bylaws, etc. This information is easily adaptable to the statutory forms in each state. An interesting monograph on "Trade-Marks," a not-too-familiar subject to most lawyers, is written by Walter J. Derenberg. He discusses trademark protection from the common law through the Registration Acts to the present day registration of trade and advertising slogans, setting out the forms necessary for applications for each.

Much valuable information is contained in these monographs—information

that can usually only be obtained through years of actual experience. These monographs should be of great interest to veterans unable to take refresher courses.

COMMENT ON STATISTICAL TABLES

During the year ending June 30, 1946, there was a substantial increase in the business of the districts courts, a moderate increase in the work of the probate courts, and a slight decline in the business of the city and county courts.

BUSINESS OF THE DISTRICT COURTS

There were 22,617 civil cases commenced and 19,642 terminated, compared to 16,330 commenced and 16,152 terminated during the preceding year. Among the civil cases disposed of, divorce cases increased from 8,903 to 11,510, and other civil cases increased from 7,249 to 8,132, a substantial increase in all types of cases. Trials of contested cases increased from 2,475 to 3,370, and civil

jury trials increased from 106 to 174. Seventy-eight percent of the contested cases were tried within six months from date of filing, compared with 75 percent in the preceding year.

Criminal cases increased from 1,624 to 2,034, but the number of trials declined from 262 to 187.

The number of appeals declined from 145 to 116 in civil cases, and from 17 to 5 in criminal cases.

We have added a new table, numbered A-5, showing in a general way the types of cases filed in the district courts during the statistical year. Divorce cases and suits to quiet title now form a substantial majority of all cases filed in the district courts. Foreclosures and damage suits are still at a minimum. A continuation of this table will show any trends toward other types of business in subsequent years.

The total of 19,642 cases disposed of, is greater than for any other year during which the Judicial Council has collected statistics, except the year 1935, and the total of 22,617 cases filed is greater than 1935 or any other year. However, the number of divorce cases is still disproportionate to other types of business. 8,911 divorces were granted, compared with 6,006 in the preceding year, an increase of almost 50 percent, and this is probably the highest number of divorces ever granted in a single year in Kansas.

BUSINESS OF THE PROBATE COURTS

During this year 4,723 decedent's estates were opened compared with 4,249 in the preceding year, but only 4,177 were closed, compared with 4,331. 1,340 guardianships were opened, compared with 1,176, and 756 were closed, compared with 655. Proceedings for determination of descent increased from 3,649 to 4,601. Juvenile and adoption cases also showed a moderate increase, and more trusts are under the supervision of the courts. There were fewer habeas corpus cases in probate courts, but all other types of business showed some increase.

There has been a slight decline in number of estates closed within fifteen months after filing, and in the percentage of pending estates which have been pending less than one year, but this is not great enough to indicate any substantial delay. Inventories or accounts were filed in 83 percent of the decedents' estates and in 58 percent of the guardianships and in 57 percent of the trust estates, which on the whole is an improvement over the figures for the preceding year.

There are now being filed almost as many descent proceedings as estates requiring full administration, without affecting the total number of the latter, continuing the trend noted in our last statistical report.

COUNTY COURTS

Civil business in county courts has declined about ten percent, but criminal cases in these courts have increased over fifty percent. One new county court has been created in Wabaunsee county, making a total of 47 county courts now established.

CITY COURTS

Civil business in city courts has declined over ten percent, but the number of criminal cases has increased about twenty percent. There have been no changes in the number or location of city courts.

SUMMARY OF THE WORK OF THE SUPREME COURT

The following is a summary of the work of the supreme court for the year ended June 30, 1946, and of cases pending July 1, 1946.

There were 178 appealed civil cases disposed of within the year ended June 30, 1946. Of these, 44 were dismissed without having been presented on the merits and 134 were submitted on the merits and written opinions filed. Of these cases, 70 were affirmed, 40 reversed, 11 affirmed in part and reversed in part, 7 affirmed in part and modified in part, 1 denied, and 5 were dismissed.

The court also disposed of 19 appealed criminal cases. Of this number 6 were dismissed without having been presented on the merits and 13 were submitted on the merits, and of these cases, 10 were affirmed and 3 reversed.

The court also disposed of 43 original cases. Of this number, 15 were dismissed before having been presented on the merits, and 28 cases were submitted on the merits and written opinions filed, resulting in judgment for the plaintiff in 3 cases and for the defendant in 24 cases; 1 case was dismissed.

This makes a total of 240 cases disposed of by the supreme court, of which 65 were dismissed without having been presented on the merits and 175 were submitted on the merits and written opinions filed.

The cases pending July 1, 1946, were as follows: 85 appealed civil cases, 6 appealed criminal cases, and 28 original cases, making a total of 119 cases.

Of the 175 cases submitted to the supreme court on the merits and in which written opinions were filed, in 24 cases the opinions were filed before the first regular opinion day, in 128 cases on the first regular opinion day, in 14 cases on the second regular opinion day, in 6 cases on the third regular opinion day, in 1 case on the fourth regular opinion day, 1 case on the fifth regular opinion day, and 1 case dismissed. The regular opinion day ordinarily is a month after the case is submitted; more accurately it is the Saturday of the week hearings are had the next month after the case is submitted.

In the 134 appealed civil cases in which opinions were filed within the year ended June 30, 1946, the time between the date notice of appeal was filed in this court and the date the case was submitted on its merits is as follows: Within 3 months, 19 cases; in 3 to 4 months, 15 cases; in 4 to 5 months, 23 cases; in 5 to 6 months, 33 cases; in 6 to 7 months, 13 cases; in 7 to 8 months, 4 cases; in 8 to 9 months, 8 cases; in 9 to 12 months, 14 cases; and over 12 months, 5 cases.

In the 13 appealed criminal cases in which opinions were filed within the year ended June 30, 1946, the time between the date the notice of appeal was filed in the supreme court and the date the case was submitted on its merits is as follows: Within 3 months, 1 case; in 4 to 5 months, 3 cases; in 5 to 6 months, 1 case; in 7 to 8 months, 3 cases; in 8 to 9 months, 1 case; in 9 to 12 months, 2 cases; and over 12 months, 2 cases.

In the year ended June 30, 1946, the court disposed of 372 motions, of which 353, or 95 percent, were disposed of in 30 days; average time, 5 days.

There were pending in the supreme court July 1, 1946, a total of 119 cases compared with 123 cases on the same date in 1945, 99 cases in 1944, 109 in 1943,

175 in 1942, 144 in 1941, 192 in 1940, 249 in 1939, 244 in 1938, 210 in 1937, 268 in 1936, 291 in 1935, 366 in 1934, 333 in 1933, 357 in 1932, 393 in 1931, 397 in 1930, 376 in 1929, and 341 in 1928.

In the 19 years the clerk of the supreme court has furnished us detailed information of the work of the court, it has disposed of 9,040 cases, of which 2,864 were dismissed before final submission, and 6,176 were submitted on the merits and written opinions filed.
