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## FOREWORD

In this issue we again print our annual statistical tables showing the business transacted by the courts of the state during the year ended June 30, 1950, together with brief comments on the general trends in the litigation in these courts. Several years ago these tables were condensed for printing to keep within our budget, but are compiled in somewhat more detail in our office, particularly with reference to the civil business of the district courts. If any of our readers desire further information we would be glad to furnish it if we can.

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In Table A-1 appears the roster of judicial officers, as of July 1, 1950. Since that date we have been advised of the death of District Judge Wallace H. Anderson of the Thirty-seventh district and of Probate Judges Clyde M. Hudson of Sedgwick county and George H. Terrill of Morton county. Their names are retained on the list because they served during the period covered by these statistics.

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Miss Marie Russell, of Topeka, whose portrait appears on our cover, is one of the outstanding women lawyers of Kansas. In this issue we print her article on the facilities and services of the state library, particularly the law department of which she is the head. Miss Russell modestly fails to mention that one of the greatest assets of the state law library is her assistance to the lawyers and judges, as well as the law students, of the state. Her gratuitous help and untiring research is always available and has been invaluable to the bench and bar.

Miss Russell comes from a family of lawyers. She is the daughter of H. A. Russell, formerly of Scott City, now a Topeka attorney; and is the niece of Frank U. Russell, Hutchinson attorney, and of the late W. H. Russell of La Crosse, whose recent death is a loss to the bar of this state. Miss Russell is a graduate of the University of Kansas (A. B.) and of Washburn Law School (J. D.) and of Simmons College (M. S.), and was admitted to the bar in 1925. For many years she has served as instructor in the Washburn Law School and has been active in the work of the Bar Association of Kansas, as well as the state organization of women lawyers and the Phi Delta Delta Women's legal fraternity.

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The Judicial Council has been considering whether or not our statutes with reference to mechanic's liens, pertaining to real estate as well as personal property, should be the subject of study and research, if some lawyer competent to make the study can be found. Any lawyer interested is requested to communicate with the Council.

## The Law Department of the Kansas State Library

"A law library . . . is a specialized kind of tool chest and workshop for the lawyer and student of the law. It is useful only insofar as it is used, and the more it is used the more it is useful." So declared Professor Sidney Post Simpson while chairman of the American Bar Association's Committee on Continuing Education of the Bar. It was with the thought that perhaps some Kansas lawyers and other citizens do not realize how much use they might make of the Kansas State Library that we were asked to write a brief description of its contents and of the opportunities for its use.

The act of congress by which the territory of Kansas was organized provided that "There shall hereafter be appropriated a suitable amount . . . for the purchase of a library, to be kept at the seat of the government for the use of the governor, legislative assembly, judges of the supreme court, secretary, marshal, and attorney general of said territory, and such other persons, and under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law." Accordingly in 1855, \$5,000 was appropriated for this purpose, and in due time the books were purchased. The control of the library passed from one state official to another, until in 1873 the justices of the supreme court were made directors and were authorized to make such rules and regulations as might be necessary for the proper care and management of the library.

The north wing of the state house was planned with the thought of housing the library. Special floor reinforcements and heavy pillars were arranged to care for the extra weight of books and the undivided space of the third and fourth floors was given over to it. And, now as this is written, the library is celebrating its golden anniversary of the occupancy of its present quarters! Miss Annie Diggs, the state librarian at that time, wrote in her annual report:

"The long anticipated and most gratifying event of the moving of the state library was completed during the month of September, 1900. The new rooms are not only spacious and commodious, but delightfully attractive as well . . . The bookstacks run seven shelves high on the first floor, then a gallery with glass floor, reached by stairways, has still another series of adjustable shelves, making in all a capacity of 100,000 volumes. There is no convenience known to the modern library which is unsupplied. The large spaces set aside for reading-rooms on either side of the great hall are finely lighted by large windows which command beautiful views of Topeka's best buildings. The soft, green carpet of cork and rubber was manufactured to order in Scotland with especial reference to durability. The long reading-tables and abundant chairs are antique oak, plain of design yet elegant of finish, and built to endure."

Long ago a third tier of stacks was added, shelves have been tucked into every available space, outside storage has been used, yet at the present time one of our greatest problems is that of housing. We do, however, have the well-lighted and cheerful reading rooms where there is usually ample space to work comfortably. Fluorescent lights now supplement the "large windows." The quality of the "soft, green carpet of cork and rubber" and the "long reading tables of antique oak" is attested by the fact that some of the "carpet" still covers space between the book stacks and most of the "long reading tables

of antique oak" are still in use. It might be interesting to note that these enduring things are reminders of a Populist regime.

Many lawyers are entirely aware of the facilities of the state library. When they have important cases upon which they wish to concentrate or perhaps must meet deadlines in preparing a brief, they come to the library to do their work. Here they know they have available both the ordinary and the out-of-the-ordinary material to meet their needs and can work uninterrupted by clients or other business. This is true both of local lawyers and those over the state who come in especially to use the library or make an opportunity to use it for a few hours when they are in Topeka for other reasons. However, in many instances the lawyer cannot be away from his office or the matter involved may not justify the expense of a trip to Topeka. Some of these probably do not realize that service to them is available wherever they are. We lend practically anything we have in the library and it is sometimes possible for us to secure items which we do not have through interlibrary loan. Although loans secured from others cannot always be reloaned, information can be verified and relayed from such material. If in doubt whether or not desired material is available, it is just as well to ask because usually we will have it.

Perhaps most Kansas lawyers are more or less familiar with the general type of material in the law department. It might, however, be a convenience to those who have not been in the library and are not accustomed to using it through loan privileges, to suggest generally the classes of material available.

*Federal Laws.* We have all of the Statutes at Large, the United States Code, the United States Code Annotated, the Federal Code Annotated, in addition to most of the older compilations. We also have many volumes on special subjects, such as military law, Indian land laws, patent laws, bankruptcy law, etc. The current enactments of congress come to us fairly quickly in the form of slip laws published by the Superintendent of Documents, in the Congressional Service published by the West Publishing Company, and a little later in the supplements to the other compilations. New laws on certain special subjects, such as taxation and social security, are received in the loose-leaf services almost as soon as enacted. Other new laws of special interest or importance are available immediately in the Statute Section of the United States Law Week.

*Federal Reports and Digests.* The library has the three current sets of United States reports, the Official Edition, the Lawyers' Edition, and the Supreme Court Reporter. The opinions of the supreme court when handed down on a Monday reach us on Thursday in the United States Law Week. A little later we receive the pamphlet edition of the cases as published by the Superintendent of Documents and the advance sheets for the various sets of reports. We have the Federal Reporter, the Federal Supplement, Federal Rules Decisions, of course, as well as the older series, such as Federal Cases, and the old reports which were published under the names of the reporters, as Benedict's Reports. Whenever a federal department or bureau publishes reports, those will be found here. Examples are the Interstate Commerce Commission Reports, the Federal Trade Commission Reports, and the Tax Court Reports. We have up-to-date digests and citators for the court reports.

*State Laws and Reports.* The library has complete sets of session laws for most of the states which were organized at approximately the same time or later than Kansas, and complete runs for the older states from about 1850, as well as many of the older laws. For all states we have the latest statutory compilation or revision in addition to many of the older ones. As might be expected, our set of Kansas territorial and state laws is complete. Some of the early volumes contain very interesting and often useful material. For example, the volume of Private Laws of 1858 contains a chapter incorporating Baker University, the Private Laws of 1860 has a chapter incorporating the city of Denver, while the volume for 1864 includes the law incorporating the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad.

We have the court reports of all states with a citator for each state. With the exception of those for Kansas and Missouri, we no longer attempt to keep up-to-date state digests, but depend on the digests for the various units of the Reporter system and the American Digest series. The Reporter system insures the location of most cases when the particular state report needed happens to be in use.

The well known *encyclopedias* and *selected case series* are all here, as well as some which may not be so familiar to every one, such as the Negligence and Compensation Reports.

*Textbooks.* We buy all of the current legal textbooks which are indicated as having new and authoritative information, and have kept many old editions. The latter are referred to with surprising frequency and are often particularly valuable for their notes and annotations. One interested in seeing any of the newly advertised books will usually find them here. In addition to the strictly legal texts, the library also has many books of more general interest such as biographies of lawyers and judges, books on legal philosophy and history, hints on trial practices, etc. Examples of recent additions in this class are:

"Missouri lawyer," an autobiography by John T. Barker.

"The devil in Massachusetts, a modern inquiry into the Salem Witch Trials," by Marion L. Starkey.

"On understanding the Supreme Court," a series of lectures delivered at Northwestern University by Paul A. Freund.

"Of men and mountains," by Supreme Court Justice Wm. O. Douglas.

The present-day interest in psychiatry and psychology, especially as it extends into the field of law, has resulted in requests for books such as Bromberg's "Crime and the mind" and Abrahamsen's "Crime and the human mind." In fact, the lawyer's interests are so broad that books on engineering, accounting, geology, or any one of many other subjects may have to be studied in connection with the legal texts.

The many volumes of *Trials* also supply interesting and instructive reading.

*Loose-leaf Services* covering the following subjects are maintained: Federal taxation; Unemployment insurance; Corporations; Aviation; Federal rules; Federal carriers; Congressional index; Trade regulation; Labor law; Wills, estates and trusts; Emergency business control.

*Legal Periodicals.* At the present time the library is receiving about 150 American and British legal periodicals which are indexed in the "Index to

Legal Periodicals." These contain much valuable material particularly on current or unusual problems. They are not only practical as a source of legal information but also sometimes help in preparing papers or talks. And mentioning "current or unusual subjects," we are reminded to say that some very worth-while articles or lectures are found in the reports of legal institutes such as New York University's Annual Conference on Labor and its Institute on Federal Taxation, the Chicago Symposium on Medicolegal Problems, the Southwestern Legal Foundation's Institute on Oil and Gas Law, and the National Institute of Municipal Law Officers' "Municipalities and the law in action."

*British Laws and Reports.* Almost any English, Canadian, Scotch, Irish or Australian case or statute which might be needed can be found here. We also have up-to-date collections of statutes and reports for each Canadian province. The fact that we are close neighbors and friendly, visiting ones, perhaps makes Canadian law most often useful. When a client dies owning Canadian property, where an accident occurs in Canada, or if a client has contractual relations involving Canadian objects or citizens, it is necessary to consult either Canadian lawyers or Canadian laws. We can provide the laws and can even suggest a lawyer through our Legal Directories, if requested to do so. There are also encyclopedias and digests for the countries mentioned.

More and more contacts are being made between the United States and Mexico, Central America and South American countries and calls for information have stimulated the buying of English translations or summaries of the laws of these countries whenever they can be located. We expect that the collection will be greatly increased in the future. It looks as though this might be true of Continental law as well.

Much useful material will also be found in the Reference, Legislative Reference and Medical departments of the library.

The Kansas State Library is a government depository library receiving practically all material distributed by the Superintendent of Documents, and also receives much departmental material from sister states by exchange arrangement. The Congressional Committee Reports and Hearings and the Congressional Record are invaluable when the interpretation of a federal law is involved. The Code of Federal Regulations and the publications of the Federal Administrative Departments are available through our Reference Department. One cannot fail to acknowledge the importance of these publications in these days when administrative law dominates the whole scene. For an example of a case in which the Kansas Supreme Court used this type of material, see *Citizens State Bank v. Farmers Union Livestock Cooperative Company*, 165 Kan. 96.

The Legislative Reference Department contains an index of all bills introduced in the Kansas legislature beginning with 1909, as well as bound copies of the bills themselves. It also has a file containing information about all members of the legislature since the state was organized. Newspaper articles discussing legislation or proposed legislation are clipped and classified. Although we have a complete set of Kansas House and Senate Journals, the lawyer who hopes to find therein reasons for the passage of a particular law, or light on its meaning, is most often disappointed. These Journals do not contain reports of committee discussion or of arguments on the floor of the

House or Senate. Occasionally a little information may be obtained from committee reports or from an amendment proposed from the floor, but the newspaper clippings mentioned are usually more enlightening.

The Stormont Medical Library, a department of the State Library, furnishes a surprising amount of assistance valuable to lawyers. Murder investigations, blood tests to determine paternity, tests for drunkenness, negligence and compensation cases, especially those involving industrial toxicology, often have required information beyond that included in our texts on Medical jurisprudence, and the lawyer interested has found the material he needed in the texts and current periodicals available in the medical collection. This is especially true where expert witnesses are to be used in a case. Incidentally, we have had expert witnesses, as well as the lawyers, using the medical books. We might cite one example of the use of medical material in a legal case. In *Jensen v. Reeble*, 167 Kan. 1, our supreme court cited texts from the Stormont Library in connection with the question as to whether a child born 295 days after his mother was divorced could be the legitimate son of the man from whom the divorce was obtained.

There are certain details about borrowing books from the state library which it is necessary to know and we offer some suggestions which will facilitate quick and satisfactory service. We attempt to fill all orders immediately. All material is sent under a special library loan postage rate of four cents for the first pound, plus one cent for each additional pound. The rate is the same for any point in the state. The borrower is expected to pay postage both ways. Our usual loan period is ten days, with the privilege of renewing for a like period. We are, however, very willing to allow a borrower to keep the books longer if he is actually using them. Regardless of the length of the loan period, we do wish to have material returned as soon as the borrower has finished using it. Some material such as loose-leaf services, statutes of other states, and briefs and abstracts, we ask to have returned within two or three days, if possible. When telephoning for material, the call should be made by 3:30 as no mail leaves the state house after 4:30. On Saturdays state house mail is taken to the post office at 11:30 only.

A lawyer may want Shepard's citations to a case or cases, or need a copy of a certain section of an old law or the law of some other state, or the state citations to cases which he already has in the reporter system. These and similar requests may be taken care of very easily by letter.

If the lawyer has a particular problem, but doesn't know what books might be helpful, we are glad to send out what we consider our best material on the general subject involved, but we can select this material much more intelligently if we are told just what the question is. Not long ago we received a request (from a layman) for "a lawbook on grocery stores and meat markets." Should we send material on the Pure Food and Drug Law, contracts, sales, negligence, or perhaps zoning? It is plain to see that a more definite request would result in greater satisfaction to the borrower, and save time for every one. When asking for a report or reporter, if the title of the case desired, or even the page number is given, we can usually locate the case even though the particular book asked for is being used, as many cases are printed in more than one publication. In other words, we are glad to try to seek out illusive and intangible information when there

are no signposts available, but any request for service should be stated as clearly and definitely as possible for the best results.

A story is told<sup>1</sup> that some years ago an American lawyer was visiting the great Bodleian Library in England. As he was shown through the ancient corridors, he commented on what a treasure the collection was to scholars of the law. The librarian guiding him agreed, but expressed great concern over the future of the collection. The lawyer replied that surely it would be possible to keep it up even in difficult times. The librarian replied: "It is not that which worries me. It is what this library will be like a hundred years from now. It would be well enough if we could keep the books on the shelves all the time. But most unfortunately, you see, people are permitted to *use* these books!" The state library staff takes no such attitude. We like to have our material used, though it does contain many treasures, and each librarian is very willing to do anything possible to assist those who come to the library and those who may send requests.

## Comment on Statistical Tables

In compliance with G. S. 20-2203, the Judicial Council has assembled statistics showing the work of the courts for the year ended June 30, 1950. These figures are set out in the following tables, which are generally in the same form as last year.

These statistics do not show any decisive changes in the volume or trends of business for the current year, as compared with the year 1949. There are small increases and decreases in particular types of litigation, which are hereinafter mentioned, but on the whole this year shows more leveling off in the work of the courts than any year since World War II.

### SUPREME COURT

There has been a slight decline in the number of cases in the supreme court, but this decline has been largely confined to a decrease in the number of original cases. Civil appeals increased from 284 in 1949 to 304 in 1950, but the number actually submitted to the court have declined from 230 to 213. Criminal appeals submitted have declined from 14 to 13, and only 11 original cases were submitted, compared with 65 in 1949. Without making an authoritative study of the types of original cases, we believe that this decline has largely been in the number of habeas corpus cases filed by inmates of the state penitentiary. The decline in other types of business has been too slight to have any great significance.

### DISTRICT COURTS

Divorce cases, which have been decreasing since 1946, showed a slight increase this year. This year there were 8,092 divorce cases commenced and 7,763 terminated, compared with 7,809 commenced and 7,462 terminated in the year ended June 30, 1949. However, the actual number of divorces granted increased only from 4,743 in 1949 to 4,881 in 1950, an increase of less than three per cent. (This is far below the peak in 1946, when 13,472 divorce cases were filed and 8,911 divorces were granted.)

Other civil cases declined slightly—8,288 were filed and 7,879 terminated, compared with 8,516 filed and 8,247 terminated in 1949. This decrease was principally in suits to quiet title, in which the decline was large. There was a slight increase in suits for the recovery of money, damages, foreclosure, ejectment, injunction and habeas corpus, and in the number of appeals from probate courts.

There was also an increase in the number of criminal cases in the district courts, particularly felony cases. A total of 2,663 criminal cases were disposed of, compared with 2,348 in 1949. There were 1,907 felony cases filed in the year ended June 30, 1950, an increase from 1,611 in 1949. There were fewer misdemeanor cases filed in the district courts, but this is more than offset by the increase of criminal cases in the county courts. Among the felony cases, there were more prosecutions for manslaughter, rape, robbery, felonious assault, burglary, robbery and larceny, as well as forgery, bad checks, and wife and child desertion, but none of these showed any alarming trend during the current year.

The number of jury trials (civil and criminal) declined from 517 in 1949 to 481 in 1950.

## SPEED OF LITIGATION IN DISTRICT COURTS

When the Judicial Council was first organized and commenced gathering statistics, a great deal of attention was given to ascertaining the length of time which was required to conclude litigation in the district courts. As a result of these studies, the Judicial Council recommended that the supreme court adopt rules providing for frequent motion days and other measures designed to expedite such litigation. The supreme court followed this recommendation in 1929, and adopted certain rules which are printed as section 60-3827 in the General Statutes of 1935, with amendments to 1936. These rules have had a salutary effect, as shown by our earlier statistics. In recent years our statistical tables have necessarily been condensed to reduce printing expense, but we have continued to gather information each year from the clerks of the district courts, showing the dates of the filing and trial of each case which has been tried. As an approximate test of the speed of litigation, we have eliminated the cases which were dismissed and the cases which were not contested, and have ascertained the percentage of *contested* civil cases which were tried within six months after the petition was filed. For the year ended June 30, 1950, these figures are as follows, for the state as a whole:

This is a very creditable showing for the district courts of Kansas. Since the war years there has been a slight decline in the percentage of cases tried within six months after the petition was filed, but this is largely accounted for by the increase in the number of cases. Bearing in mind that these figures include only contested trials, in which pretrial motions and demurrers often take up a great deal of time, the district courts have tried over two-thirds of the contested cases within six months after the cases were commenced, during each and every year shown above. While conditions vary from county to county and from one judicial district to another, the Judicial Council has not found any evidence of undue delay in the disposition of business by the district courts.

### PRETRIAL CONFERENCES

This year we asked the clerks of the district courts to note any cases in which pretrial conferences were held under the provisions of the new statute (Chapter 318, Session Laws of 1949).

Only thirty-nine cases were reported for the entire state in which pretrial conferences were held. Because of the small number reported, we have not included this in our statistical tables.

The distribution of these cases, in which pretrial conferences were held, is as follows by counties:

Barber, 2; Cowley, 1; Crawford, 1; Decatur, 1; Edwards, 5; Harper, 2; Jackson, 1; Jefferson, 3; Kingman, 4; Morris 1; Morton, 4; Neosho, 5; Pratt, 2; Republic, 4; Saline, 1; Sedgwick, 2.

It will be noted that 32 of the 39 pretrial conferences were held in six judicial districts, as follows: Seventh, 5; Twelfth, 4; Twenty-fourth, 10; Thirty-third, 5; Thirty-sixth, 4; and Thirty-ninth, 4. The other 7 pretrial conferences were scattered over six districts, and no pretrial conferences were held in over two-thirds of the judicial districts of the state.

### PROBATE COURTS

There was a moderate increase in the work of the probate courts during the year ended June 30, 1950. There were 4,753 estates of decedents opened and 4,413 closed, compared with 4,365 opened and 4,322 closed in 1949; and there were 1,339 guardianships opened, compared with 1,210 in the previous year. The number of trusts under supervision increased from 699 to 751—juvenile cases increased from 897 to 1,048—adoptions increased from 1,244 to 1,385—and insanity hearings increased from 973 to 1,063. There was a slight decline in the number of proceedings for determination of descent, from 2,533 in 1949 to 2,486 in 1950.

### CITY AND COUNTY COURTS

There was a substantial increase in the business of the county courts, both civil and criminal, and in the civil business of the city courts, as shown below:

### GENERAL CONCLUSIONS

There is no great change in the volume of litigation or the activities of the courts over the preceding year. So far the district courts have made little use of the procedure for pretrial conferences, authorized by the legislature of 1949. There have been no other statutory changes which have materially affected the work of the courts during this period.
