FOREWORD

Following our customary practice, we have asked the Honorable D. B. Lang of Scott City, President of the Bar Association of the State of Kansas, and whose photograph is shown on the cover, to prepare an article on a subject of his own choosing for publication in this issue of the BULLETIN. He has done so and we feel that his article will be of particular interest to lawyers throughout the state.

Mr. Lang is a native Kansan, and was graduated from Salina High School. He attended Kansas Wesleyan University for one year and then entered the University of Kansas from which he received his LL. B. degree. He was admitted to the practice of law in 1922, and entered active practice with R. D. Armstrong in Scott City. This association continued until 1945, except for the period 1928 to 1934 when Mr. Lang served as county attorney. He has been active in many lines of civic affairs, having served as City Attorney of Scott City; District Governor of Lions International; Commander of his American Legion Post; Chairman of Red Cross Drive, and Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the Scott County Hospital. Mr. Lang's memberships in various organizations include the Southwest Kansas Bar Association; Book & Scales Bar Association; Bar Association of the state of Kansas; American Bar Association; Lions International; American Legion; Masonic orders; Kappa Sigma and Alpha Delta Pi fraternities, and the Methodist Church. Mrs. Lang is the former Marie Cook of Scott City. They have one daughter, Donelle.

Mr. Lang has represented the Ninth District on the Executive Council of the Bar Association of the State of Kansas since 1948. In 1958 he was elected Vice-President and the following year President-Elect.

In view of the fact that Kansas voters at the general election to be held on November 8, 1960, will, for the first time, have an opportunity to vote for or against justices of the Kansas Supreme Court under the constitutional amendment which was adopted by the people at the general election in 1958, this issue of the BULLETIN contains a reprint of an article on the subject appearing in the August 1960 *Journal* of the Bar Association of the State of Kansas.

This issue of the BULLETIN also contains summarized tables showing the volume of work in the supreme court, the district courts, probate courts, county courts and city courts of the state for the year ending June 30, 1960. The Judicial Council requests your study of the statistical information shown in the tables and invites suggestions as to any improvements that could be made in the form and contents of the information collected.

Bar Association Finances

I hope it is not inappropriate for me to discuss finances briefly, money, if you will, with relation to the Bar Association of the state of Kansas. The elected officials of any professional association and the president especially, must concern themselves not only with ethics of the profession represented, but unauthorized practice by laymen, professional advancement and education, relations with other professions and similar professional associations, legislative improvements affecting the profession, and, of course, the management and operation of the fixed establishment representing that organization. It is this single aspect with which this discussion will be concerned.

Annually it becomes necessary, and is the duty of the Executive Council, to study, formulate and adopt a proposed budget for the ensuing year. Future expenditures must be anticipated as nearly as possible, and activity must be planned within certain limits and existing revenue expected.

Dues schedules must necessarily be predicated upon the budget adopted which will provide the services desired by the members of the Association. For example, at the annual meeting this year a recommendation was adopted that the Title Standards be annotated. This is a service desired by the members and would entail an expense not previously experienced. In itself this is not too large, but it is a new item of expense. The amount expended for public relations—one of the reasons for the increase of dues in 1951—is not as large as it should be. Our public relation effort is larger than the budgeted amount would indicate, for much of the printing, mailing and public relations counselling is accomplished through the Executive Secretary and his office staff.

At the annual meeting in 1952, the Association approved dues increases to the maximum sum of \$25.00. At that particular time the dues were increased to \$20.00. Since 1952 we have been fortunate in having sufficient membership increase to help cancel out the increased cost of services during this period. Some of these are the widespread distribution of pamphlets—still at no charge, though most of the other state associations do charge for these pamphlets—and films of a public relations nature which are shown to civic groups, schools, etc., over the state. Newspaper columns have been furnished to all the state's newspapers and have, at one time or another, been carried by them. Title Standards, which are sold by many associations, have been prepared and distributed free to all of our members. The *Bar Letter* was started and at a later date the *Supreme Court Opinions Digest* was commenced and is eagerly awaited by members each quarter.

Continued increased cost of salaries, rent, stationery, printing and many other items permit of but one conclusion. Unquestionably the Executive Council must recognize the directive of the 1952 convention and fix the 1961 dues at \$25.00.

That the membership and lawyers may be acquainted with the problem facing the committee, it may not be amiss to generalize as concerns the adopted budget.

The over-all budget of expenditures aggregates the sum of \$41,000. \$15,000 is allocated to salaries, \$1,300 to rent, \$7,148 to printing of the *Bar Journal*,

\$5,000 to printing, stationery and postage, \$550 to telephone, \$2,500 to travel expense for the Executive Secretary. A. B. A. officers' travel claims \$1,500, public relations \$2,000, editor and secretary of the *Bar Journal* \$2,852, and miscellaneous \$600. Various other items of F. I. C. A., insurance, and Supreme Court *Digest* comprise the balance of the proposed expenditures under the budget.

It might be mentioned here that this Association, with its one full-time executive, has become the exception rather than the rule. One item—the printing, stationery and postage—may appear large, but were not most of the Association publications printed, addressed and mailed in the Association office, this expense would easily be twice the current amount.

The per share expense proportionately divided among the Bar is readily seen to be much less than paid in many other groups to which one might belong, and in other legal associations, and the benefits from those other groups are much smaller in many cases.

On the credit side of the ledger we anticipate that we will receive from membership dues the sum of \$36,000, *Bar Journal* ads and sales \$3,000, Supreme Court *Digest* \$1,400, interest \$350, miscellaneous \$150, and Title Standards \$100.

Our Association has indeed been fortunate to achieve a high percentage of members during the past years. It is our honest belief that lawyers appreciate the services that are being made available to them, and consistently forward their dues promptly. However, ours is a voluntary association, and even if it were possible to obtain 100 percent of the Bar of the state, it still would be evident that increased costs would demand an increase in dues for the ensuing year. As in any voluntary association, much expense is occasioned by the necessity of billing and processing memberships. Prompt remittance of dues reduces this expense. Perhaps a re-study of the advantages of an integrated Bar (every practicing lawyer a member) would be in order in the near future.

Recently an opportunity presented itself whereby we could acquire office space of long-needed proportions. We have grown to the extent that the old space was not sufficient to permit efficient operations, not to mention filing requirements which are so vital but become cumbersome. The Bar of the state can soon come to Topeka and have conference and secretarial services available, and it is urged that the Bar do so, and further acquaint themselves with the manner in which their Association is operated. It is not impossible to assume that this extra office space may be needed for an additional secretary to assist in the work on the *Bar Journal*, or be needed for an assistant to handle unauthorized practice and ethics matters.

Heretofore, there was no space where a committee of the Association could meet if they numbered over four persons, and we will now have a meeting room—a must for any association office.

Incidentally, I sometimes wonder if it is recognized by the members of the Association the amount of work that is done by the various committees, and always at the cost of the respective members' time and expenses. This facet may one day be changed and some future budget committee may have to give consideration to the reimbursement of committee members on a per diem basis with expenses.

Ours is not the only association experiencing increased costs in this inflated era. As was pointed out in a recent *Bar Letter*, a recent survey disclosed thirty-three bar associations have increased their dues—three bar associations of the same size as ours and ten associations that are larger than we are. All but five have increased their dues since 1952. Twenty of these associations have higher dues than does Kansas.

As explained above, had not membership increased since the Association office was first opened in October, 1951, the 1952 dues increase would have had to be put into effect several years ago. As it was increased, membership accounted for increased income. We have now experienced a levelling-off of membership making this long postponed step necessary. Each member should urge full membership in the state Association on the part of his local Bar.

We cannot at this writing anticipate whether we will experience a deficit in the 1960-61 budget as fixed by the Council. If our income will not satisfy our expenses a deficit will occur, and such will be caused by substantial costs and disbursements which could neither be postponed nor disregarded. Should this contingency develop, such would reduce a reserve we have attempted to maintain and safeguard. It is dangerous to operate at a deficit, and impossible for any length of time. It is difficult for any professional society to plan its programs and keep its accounts in order unless it has a substantial reserve. Good business practice would seem to require a reserve fund of not less than one-half the annual operating budget. However, this reserve has disappeared and the total assets exceed only slightly this year's budget.

The Bar is faced with two choices at this time. It must either curtail some of its present programs or it must increase its income. The former would be a backward step. The latter is the proper choice. The Executive Council believes that the members want the services with which they are being provided, and these are done for them in a most economical form. Certainly the small increase in dues is justified and membership still represents a bargain in services and "aids to practice." This increase will be as follows:

On the basis of members of the Association in 1959, this should increase the income about \$8,000, which will permit the maintenance of present services, addition of desired services (annotation of Title Standards), provision for increase in costs of operation, and some accumulation for reserve.

There has been a growing desire on the part of the Bar generally that its activities not only be maintained but that they should be increased. It seems obvious that no vital Bar function should be curtailed because of lack of funds.

The following is some indication of cost increases: Accident pamphlets in 1953 cost \$15.68—in 1957 these cost \$25.53. Professional services (annual audit) up 25%. Certain Association memberships, as National Conference of Bar Presidents, increased from \$25.00 to \$50.00. Many other items of like nature could be presented.

The illustration next to be given no doubt has application to many of our Association committees. Take, for example, the Committee on Unauthorized Practice of the Law and Professional Ethics. There is need of part-time assistants, both in investigation and in prosecution. No activity of the Bar could bring quicker and more apparent financial returns to its members than the curtailment or prohibition of the illegal practice of law by nonlawyers.

The Executive Council, as the body of elected representatives of the membership, recognizes and has performed its duty to avoid any unnecessary expense and increase of expense, and it will continue to do so. It also recognizes, however, its obligations to direct the Bar's "power to the advancement of the sciences of jurisprudence and the improvement of the administration of justice."

In our own self-interest we should pay our own way and maintain our own proper credit balances.

First Election of Supreme Court Justices on Separate Judicial Ballot at General Election in November

Kansas voters at the general election on November 8, 1960, will, for the first time, have an opportunity to vote for or against justices of the Kansas Supreme Court under the constitutional amendment which was adopted by the people at the general election in 1958. The amendment was submitted to a vote of the electors by the legislature and approved by the electors after having been fostered, recommended, and supported by the Bar Association of the State of Kansas.

Recent inquiries have indicated that a large percentage of Kansas electors do not understand the method of voting under the amendment. Therefore, it would seem to be the duty of members of the Kansas bar to explain the voting plan to, and encourage voting under the new system by, their clients, acquaintances, friends, and the general public.

The amendment, in part, provides in substance that not less than sixty days prior to the holding of the general election next preceding the expiration of the term of office of any justice, he may file in the office of the secretary of state a declaration of candidacy for election to succeed himself; and if such declaration is filed his name shall be submitted at the next election to the electors of the state on a separate judicial ballot without party designation. The amendment further provides that if the majority of those voting on the question vote against retaining a justice in office, the position or office which he holds shall be open upon the expiration of his term of office; otherwise, he shall, unless removed for cause, remain in office for the regular term of six years, from the second Monday in January following such election.

The terms of only two justices of the Kansas Supreme Court will expire in January, 1961. These are the terms of Chief Justice Jay S. Parker and Justice Clair E. Robb. Each of these justices has filed in the office of secretary of state a declaration of candidacy for election to succeed himself.

Secretary of State Paul R. Shanahan has prepared the form of the separate judicial ballot required by the amendment, and a sample of the same reads as follows:

Since Kansas lawyers are largely responsible for the adoption of the plan for the nonpartisan selection of justices of the Kansas Supreme Court, they should have interest in seeing that the plan produces the benefits which they intended. This can only be achieved if the general electorate is fully advised as to the method of voting under the plan, and actually vote.

Summary of the Work of the Supreme Court

The following is a summary of the work of the Supreme Court for the year ended June 30, 1960, and the cases pending July 1, 1960.

There were 371 appealed civil cases disposed of within the year ended June 30, 1960. Of these 142 were dismissed without having been presented on the merits and 229 were submitted on the merits. Of these cases 127 were affirmed; 41 were reversed; 5 were affirmed in part and reversed in part; 3 were affirmed in part and modified in part; 13 were dismissed; 2 were reversed in part and remanded in part; 27 were reversed with directions; 3 were reversed in part and remanded with directions; 1 was reversed in part and remanded with instructions; 1 was affirmed in part and remanded with directions; 2 were denied in part and remanded with directions; 1 was reversed on rehearing; 2 rehearings were denied, and 1 rehearing was denied in part and modified in part.

The court disposed of 43 appealed criminal cases. Of this number 28 were dismissed without having been presented on the merits and 15 were submitted on the merits. Of these cases 13 were affirmed and 2 were dismissed.

The court also disposed of 39 original cases. Of this number 8 were dismissed without having been presented on the merits and 31 cases were submitted on the merits and written opinions filed, resulting in judgment for the plaintiff in 2 cases, judgment for the defendant in 28 cases, and 1 case was dismissed.

This makes a total of 453 cases disposed of by the Supreme Court, of which 178 were dismissed without having been presented on the merits, and 275 decided on the merits.

The cases pending July 1, 1960, are as follows: 270 appealed civil cases; 47 appealed criminal cases; and 5 original cases, making a total of 322 cases pending.

Of the 275 cases submitted to the Supreme Court on the merits, in 225 cases opinions were filed on the first regular opinion day; in 22 cases on the second regular opinion day; in 2 cases on the third regular opinion day; in 1 case on the fourth regular opinion day; in 1 case on the seventh regular opinion day; in 1 case on the eighth regular opinion day, and in 1 case on the ninth regular opinion day. Twenty-two cases were decided on the day they were submitted.

The regular opinion day is ordinarily a month after the case is submitted, more accurately it is the Saturday of the week hearings are had the next month after the case is submitted.

In 229 appealed civil cases in which opinions were filed within the year ending June 30, 1960, the time between the date notice of appeal was filed in this court and the date the case was submitted on its merits was as follows: within 3 months 3 cases; in 3 to 4 months 14 cases; in 4 to 5 months 14 cases; in 5 to 6 months 35 cases; in 6 to 7 months 48 cases; in 7 to 8 months 36 cases; in 8 to 9 months 24 cases; in 9 to 12 months 32 cases; and over 12 months 23 cases.

In the 15 appealed criminal cases in which opinions were filed within the year ended June 30, 1960, the time between the date notice of appeal was filed in this court and the date the case was submitted on its merits was as follows: within 3 months no cases; in 3 to 4 months no cases; in 4 to 5 months 2 cases; in 5 to 6 months 1 case; in 6 to 7 months 3 cases; in 7 to 8 months 4 cases; in 8 to 9 months no cases; in 9 to 12 months 2 cases; and over 12 months 3 cases.

There were pending in the Supreme Court July 1, 1960, a total of 322 cases as compared to 274 cases on the same date in 1959; 284 cases on the same date in 1958; 312 cases on the same date in 1957; 272 cases on the same date in 1956; 245 cases on the same date in 1955; 197 cases on the same date in 1954; 192 cases on the same date in 1953; 223 cases on the same date in 1952; 99 cases on the same date in 1951; 189 cases in 1950; 166 cases in 1949; 208 cases in 1948; 167 cases in 1947; 119 cases in 1946; 123 cases in 1945; 99 cases in 1944; 109 cases in 1943; 175 cases in 1942; 144 cases in 1941; 192 cases in 1940; 249 cases in 1939; 244 cases in 1938; 210 cases in 1937; 268 cases in 1936; 291 cases in 1935; 366 cases in 1934; 333 cases in 1933; 357 cases in 1932; 393 cases in 1931; 397 cases in 1930; 376 cases in 1929; and 341 cases in 1928.

In the 33 years the clerk of the Supreme Court has furnished us detailed information of the work of the court, it has disposed of 14,136 cases, of which 4,622 were dismissed before submission, and 9,514 were submitted on the merits and written opinions filed.
