Foreword

The Honorable Wesley E. Brown, President of the Bar Association of the State of Kansas, has been requested to prepare an article on the subject of his choosing for publication in this issue of the BULLETIN. He has done so and we believe his article will be of particular interest to attorneys throughout the state. It is entitled "Some Views Concerning the Modernization of Kansas Courts."

Wesley E. Brown was born in Hutchinson, Kansas, on June 22, 1907; the son of Morrison H. and Julia Wesley Brown. He graduated from the Hutchinson Public Schools and attended the University of Kansas at Lawrence, doing graduate work at the Kansas City School of Law, Kansas City, Missouri.

Presently he is Judge of the United States District Court for the District of Kansas; President of the Bar Association of the State of Kansas; and a member of the Bankruptcy Committee of the Judicial Conference of the United States.

Formerly he was County Attorney of Reno County, Kansas, from 1935 to 1939; a member of the law firm of Martindell, Carey, Brown & Brabets from 1939 to 1958; served as a Lieutenant in the United States Navy from 1944 to 1946; and was Referee in Bankruptcy from April, 1958, to April, 1962, when he was appointed Judge of the United States District Court.

He was married in November, 1934, to the former Mary A. Miller of Kansas City, Missouri. Presently they are living at 316 St. James, Wichita, Kansas. They have two children, Wesley Miller Brown, a teacher at Harvard University, and Loy Brown Wiley, who lives with her husband in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

This issue of the BULLETIN also contains summarized tables showing the volume of work in the Supreme Court, the district courts, probate courts, county and city courts of the state for the year ending June 30, 1964.

The Honorable Jay S. Parker, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, pursuant to authority vested in him by G. S. 1949, 20-2201, appointed the Honorable Alex Hotchkiss, Judge of the Thirty-fifth Judicial District, to serve the unexpired term of the Honorable Spencer A. Gard who resigned, such term to commence May 20, 1964.

Each of the advisory committees appointed by the Judicial Council, to which attention was directed in the Foreword of the October, 1963, BULLETIN, has been working hard to draft modernized laws within the scope of its authority. On the following pages are reports of the chairmen of these committees.

A committee of District Judges appointed by the President of the District Judges' Association on July 1, 1963, has been working on the preparation of Pattern Jury Instructions. The Honorable Don H. Musser is Chairman of this committee. The other members are the Honorable Marion Beatty, the Honorable B. Mack Bryant, the Honorable Alex Hotchkiss, the Honorable Earl E. O'Connor, and the Honorable Frederick Wolesslagel. Professor Earl B. Shurtz of Lawrence has been serving as Editorial Associate.

For the past year they have been working under the sponsorship of the Kansas Judicial Council. Since October, 1963, this committee has met twelve times in either one or two-day sessions. To date the first ten chapters of a proposed publication "Pattern Instructions for Kansas" have been completed and are in the process of being distributed in pamphlet form to the District Judges, Judicial Council and members of the Kansas Supreme Court. The purpose of this limited distribution is to permit a thorough study and give an opportunity for criticism or change before permanent publication.

The ten chapters completed to date cover jury orientation, guides for consideration of evidence, definition of terms, motor vehicle instructions, damages, and concluding instructions. The permanent publication will include instructions for use in cases involving eminent domain, owners and occupiers of land, intentional torts and Federal Employers' Liability Act cases. The permanent book will also include illustrative sets of instructions, editorial notes, and a complete descriptive word-index will be provided by the publisher, Lawyers Co-Operative Publishing Company. The tentative goal for publication of the completed permanent volume is late 1965.

Recently this committee has elected to pursue a course independent of sponsorship by the Kansas Judicial Council to facilitate a contractual commitment with the publisher.

At the request of the Family Law Committee of the Kansas Bar Association, the Judicial Council at its meeting on September 18, 1964, appointed a committee of three District Judges and John A. Emerson of Lawrence, Reporter, to make a study of family law administered by the Kansas courts and to make recommendations and draft legislation, if necessary, to establish family courts or otherwise facilitate the administration of family law in our courts. The Honorable Alex Hotchkiss, Judge of the Thirty-fifth Judicial District, is Chairman of this committee in his capacity as a member of the Judicial Council. The other members of this advisory committee are the Honorable Sam H. Sturm, the Honorable Earl E. O'Connor and the Honorable James V. Riddel, Jr.

Some Views Concerning the Modernization of Kansas Courts

Historically, the Bar Association of the State of Kansas has sought to have a continuity in its efforts to serve the Bench and Bar. Thus, while the Bar Association took a leading role in the successful campaign of 1958 for a constitutional amendment providing for the non-partisan selection of Justices of the Kansas Supreme Court, this was just one step in the Bar Association's efforts to improve the administration of justice in Kansas. It is for this reason, among others, that at the beginning of my tenure as President of the Bar Association, the work of the Association was divided into three categories: Improvement of the courts; improvement of law; and improvement of the bar. The President-Elect, Mr. Bannon, the Vice-President, Mr. Davis, and the member of the Executive Council next in line, Mr. Balch, were asked to, and accepted the assignment for the responsibility of supervising the committees implementing the work of the Bar in these categories.

It was by specific designation that the categories of the improvement of the courts ranked at the top of the list of our Bar Association's activities and to provide the necessary continuity of purpose that Mr. Bannon was given this assignment.

Our courts are the bulwark for the maintenance and improvement of justice in our society. The improvement of law or of the bar must depend directly upon our courts and how well they function. Without an efficient and just court system all of our efforts in the Bar Association will be without substance.

More than fifty years ago it was pointed out by one of our foremost legal scholars that "our system of courts is archaic," "our procedure is behind the times," "our judicial power is wasted," "putting courts into politics has almost destroyed the traditional respect for the bench."¹

The remedy, according to Dean Pound was:

1. Non-political selection of judges, reasonably secure tenure, adequate compensation and retirement for them.
2. Unified statewide court organization.
3. Simple and speedy judicial procedures established and administered under judicial rule-making power.
4. Efficient and businesslike court administration.
5. A unified legal profession with high standards of admissions, ethics and self-discipline.
6. Simple, speedy and low cost adjudication of small claims and minor offenses.
7. Legal services and equal justice for all.

Our Kansas judicial machinery was designed as a part of our State Constitution more than one hundred years ago. Our judicial system was created to fit the desires and fill the needs of that time. A time that compared to our present way of life was indeed primitive. Few specific changes have been made in the judicial article of the State Constitution since its adoption in

1859. The most recent change noted above was the constitutional amendment for non-partisan selection of Supreme Court Justices. Substantial changes have been effected by legislative enactment but these statutes must be fitted within the limitations of our Constitution.

There has been no comprehensive study of the entire judicial article or any total appraisal of our judicial system against the background of our present and future needs and conditions. Our Supreme Court Justices are presently inadequately equipped with quarters and assistance which they need to aid them in carrying out their supervision of the Kansas judicial system.

Since 1859 immense changes have occurred in our population, in industrial activity, and in communications and transportation. Only the geographical boundaries of our state remain the same. It therefore seems logical to have a total re-appraisal of our system of administering justice.

It was with this thought in mind that the Executive Council of the Bar Association early this year authorized a complete study and re-evaluation of our entire Kansas court system, from the lowest courts to the highest.

In connection with this, we were fortunate to obtain the services and resources of the Joint Committee for the Effective Administration of Justice and the American Judicature Society. These groups, working with a grant from the Kellogg Foundation, have been instrumental in setting up judicial reform conferences in several states.

Last February, a Steering Committee composed of Rep. Clyde Hill, Yates Center; the Hon. Doyle White, Arkansas City; the Hon. David Prager, Topeka; the Hon. Maurice Wildgen, Larned; Sen. Glee S. Smith, Larned; J. Richards Hunter, Hutchinson; the Hon. Leo A. McNalley, Minneapolis; Sen. William Farmer, Wichita, and myself, met with Robert Allard of Chicago, a representative of the Joint Committee and the American Judicature Society, to discuss the possibility of the Bar Association of the State of Kansas spearheading such a conference in this state.

It was the unanimous consensus of the Steering Committee at its first meeting that judicial reform is badly needed in Kansas, and that the Bar Association should begin work immediately in planning such a conference. It was at this first meeting, also, that a permanent committee for a judicial reform conference was selected.

Philip H. Lewis of Topeka is chairman of the Conference Committee. Members are Richard A. Barber, Lawrence; John E. Blake, Sr., Kansas City; Claude E. Chalfant, Hutchinson; Lawrence E. Curfman, Wichita; Douglas Hudson, Fort Scott; Paul R. Kitch, Wichita; D. B. Lang, Scott City; Thomas M. Lillard, Jr., Salina; Ward D. Martin, Topeka; Perry L. Owsley, Pittsburg; and D. Arthur Walker, Arkansas City.

Also, in early discussions it was agreed that support of the Bar for judicial reform would not be enough; that a wide base of lay support must be obtained if there was to be any hope for effective court re-organization in Kansas.

It was from these and other deliberations that the Citizens' Conference on Modernization of Kansas Courts was born.

As this article is being printed, 120 of the leading lay citizens of Kansas—men and women carefully selected as leaders of business and industry throughout the state—are meeting at the University of Kansas, Lawrence. They are discussing ways to improve our admittedly outmoded Kansas court system.

And it is hoped that this group of citizens will provide for us a definitive plan upon which we can base our future efforts in the area of court modernization.

The work of this Citizens' Conference is the beginning. It cannot provide us with a finished product but it can call attention to our needs. The Bar Association and its officers should provide the leadership for this essential effort of providing the judges and lawyers with the tools to bring justice to all. We would hope that the Judicial Council with its legislative authority of a continuous duty to survey and study the judicial department of the state will bend every effort to assist in this program. They, however, cannot perform the task alone. It will be the responsibility of all citizens of just purpose to assist in the modernization and implementation of the judicial branch of our state government.

Revision of the Probate Code Relating to Treatment of the Mentally Ill and Guardianships

As reported in the December, 1963, JUDICIAL COUNCIL BULLETIN, the 1963 session of the Legislature, by House Concurrent Resolution No. 43, authorized and directed the Judicial Council "To make a comprehensive, exhaustive and complete study of those provisions of the Kansas Probate Code relating to the commitment and admission of persons to state mental hospitals, the guardianship of the person and property of incompetents including the mentally ill, chronically physically ill, and the conservation of the estates of such persons and also of any other statutes of this state, civil or criminal, which use the terms 'lunatic,' 'idiot,' 'imbecile,' 'feeble minded,' and 'distracted person'."

This study is being done by a Committee of the Judicial Council composed of Dan Hopson, Jr., Joe H. Swinehart, Raymond Briman, Marvin E. Thompson, Donald L. Burnett, Roy Kirby and Robert H. Cobean, ex-officio chairman.

The Committee has tentatively completed its study and has drafted a proposed act to be cited as "The act for obtaining psychiatric 'care or treatment'." This provides procedures for obtaining both voluntary and involuntary "care or treatment" for a "mentally ill person" (the phrase insane person will no longer be used). The procedure is Probate Court centered and gives to the "patient" all the constitutional and other safeguards of right to counsel and the right to trial by jury, if requested. It also preserves the concept of the existing ninety-day referral, if requested in writing by the patient and his counsel. This act specifically provides: "A 'patient' shall not lose his rights as a citizen, his property rights or his legal capacity—, unless a court of competent jurisdiction has found the 'patient' to be incapacitated—." This procedure for "care or treatment," since it will not deprive a patient of his rights, will not be opened to public inspection, will not become a part of an abstract of title, will be treated as hospital records are now treated and will be a completely separate file and case from a proceeding for a "guardian" or "conservator."

In the case where the person is not only a "mentally ill person" but is also an "incapacitated person" there is now being drafted a companion "Act for obtaining a 'guardian' and 'conservator'." This procedure will affect the right of the "incapacitated person" to deal with his property, will be a public record open to inspection by all and will be part of an abstract of title, and so forth.

Because there will be many times when both "care or treatment" and guardianship and conservatorship are necessary and proper, the procedure for conducting these separate proceedings will be so similar that they may be consolidated for trial purposes, even though the separate "care or treatment" file and proceeding will not be records open to inspection by the public while the guardianship and conservatorship file and proceeding will be.

The term "incapacitated person" shall mean any person who is mentally impaired by reason of mental illness, mental deficiency, physical illness or disability, advanced age, chronic addiction to narcotic drugs, chronic intoxication, or other cause to the extent that he lacks sufficient understanding or

capacity to make or communicate responsible decisions concerning either his person or his estate.

The existing concept of a guardian of the person is replaced by the definition:

“The term ‘guardian’ shall mean any person who has been appointed by a court of competent jurisdiction to exercise control over the person of an ‘incapacitated person’ or of a ‘minor’.”

The existing concept of a guardian of the estate is replaced by the definition:

“The term ‘conservator’ shall mean any person who has been appointed by a court of competent jurisdiction to exercise control over the estate of any person.”

The term “conservator” is adopted for the reason that an “incapacitated person” includes a person who, by physical disability only, may lack sufficient understanding or capacity to make or communicate responsible decisions concerning his estate. This person will be given the right to himself voluntarily petition for the appointment of a “conservator” to administer his estate and be accountable for the same.

The Committee and the Judicial Council intend to have the final drafts of these Acts available to be printed and distributed to interested persons prior to their consideration by the 1965 Legislature.

Recodification of Criminal Code

The Advisory Committee on Criminal Law Revision has met monthly since September 1, 1963. It has had one joint meeting with the Judicial Council. To date it has been concerned exclusively with proposed revisions of the substantive law. It has prepared proposed articles dealing with general concepts, principles of criminal liability, anticipatory crimes, crimes against persons, sexual crimes, and crimes against the family. Sixty-six proposed sections have been drawn. These sections codify many of the case law concepts, as well as replace nearly a hundred sections of the present statutes. The objective is to present a clear, concise and coherent code of substantive criminal law.

Summary of the Work of the Supreme Court

The following is a summary of the work of the Supreme Court for the year ending June 30, 1964, and the cases pending July 1, 1964.

The Supreme Court disposed of 413 cases during the year, 4 cases under the average for the preceding ten years. Included in the total disposed of by the Court were 338 appealed civil cases, 47 appealed criminal cases and 28 were original cases.

Of the total civil appeals, 96 were affirmed, 63 were reversed, 164 dismissed, 8 affirmed in part and reversed in part, 4 affirmed as modified, 1 judicial action ceased and 2 permission to appeal denied.

Of the appealed criminal cases 22 were affirmed, none was reversed, 23 dismissed, 1 affirmed in part and reversed in part, and 1 appeal sustained.

Judgment was for the plaintiff in 1 original case and for the defendant in 14 others. The Court dismissed 13 original cases.

The Supreme Court also issued 669 orders prior to final disposition of cases pending during the year and in addition ruled upon 105 post-decision motions.

Pending in the Supreme Court as of July 1, 1964, were 246 cases, of which 181 were appealed civil cases, 61 appealed criminal cases and 4 original cases. The average number of cases pending on July 1, for the past ten years, is 305.

During the year ending July 1, 1964, opinions were filed in 230 cases. In 201 cases opinions were filed on the first regular opinion day; in 9 cases on the second regular opinion day; and in 8 cases on the third regular opinion day. 12 cases were decided on the day they were submitted.

The regular opinion day is ordinarily a month after the case is submitted, more accurately it is the Saturday of the week hearings are had the next month after the case is submitted.

In the 188 appealed civil cases in which opinions were filed within the year ending June 30, 1964, the time between the date notice of appeal was filed in this Court and the date the case was submitted on its merits was as follows: Within three months, 3 cases; in three to four months, 1 case; in four to six months, 5 cases; in six to eight months, 10 cases; in eight to ten months, 6 cases; in ten to twelve months, 70 cases; and in over twelve months, 93 cases.

In the 27 appealed criminal cases in which opinions were filed during the year ending June 30, 1964, the time between the date notice of appeal was filed in this Court and the date the case was submitted on its merits was as follows: Within four to six months, 3 cases; in six to eight months, 6 cases; in eight to ten months, 9 cases; in ten to twelve months, 2 cases; and in over twelve months, 7 cases.

In the thirty-seven years the Clerk of the Supreme Court has furnished us detailed information of the work of the Supreme Court, it has disposed of 16,028 cases, of which 5,519 were dismissed before submission, and 10,509 were submitted on the merits and written opinions filed.
